- This is a safe space for us to meet and share information




#### Copilot

#### Action Tracker

We reviewed the action tracker and identified key issues.



Hot Topics will be set for future meetings. Examples of hot topics include transport, mystery shopping, and day opportunities. We will invite the right people to discuss these issues and answer questions.



Involvement in Decision-Making is important. People with learning disabilities need to be involved. Discussion around getting more people involved from day services and residential services. This will help ensure their needs and opinions are represented in the partnership board.



**Budget Assurances:** No planned cuts to services. But the Council's need to make savings. We must spend money wisely and ensure that services meet the needs of the population.



Future Planning: Planning for future needs, including housing and complex care is important. We need to understand the future demand for services. This will help the Council prepare to meet these needs.



### Housing and Specialist Accommodation

**Specialist Housing:** Need for specialist housing for people with complex needs. Emphasized the importance of planning for future housing needs and ensuring that accommodations are suitable for individuals with disabilities.

Adaptations to meet the needs of people with disabilities. This includes covering radiators to prevent burns and ensuring accessibility for wheelchair users. Planning is important.

# Transport and Bus Services:



Bus Services Response from East Yorkshire
Buses. The response addresses the group's
concerns about changes to bus services. The letter
acknowledged the confusion caused by recent
changes. They committed to improving
communication and accessibility of information in
the future.



Clear Information and accessible information about transport services is needed. We need for easy-to-understand formats, such as easy read and Braille. This will help bus pass holders understand changes to bus services.



Communication Improvement with bus pass holders, particularly those with learning disabilities. We need direct contact from the bus companies. The group asked to be involved in future planning.



The Oliver McGowan training is for health and social care staff. It helps them understand people with learning disabilities and autistic people.

Oliver died because doctors didn't listen to Oliver or read his notes or Hospital Passport.



1200 council staff will start doing their training from June.

We still need experts and facilitators - tell us if you want to learn.

### Health and Well-being Initiatives:



Health Passports are important. They have information about your health needs. Staff need to get better at using them. It will help people with learning disabilities receive better care in hospital settings.



Joint Care Reviews are important. They help different services work better together. This helps people with a learning disability receive better care. Regular reviews are important to address individuals' changing needs.

## Age-friendly Communities:



The Age-friendly Approach wants to help people of all ages live healthy and active lives. It tries to help in a lot of different ways.

- transport
- housing
- social participation
- respect and social inclusion
- civic participation
- communication and information
- community support
- health services

There are many projects that try to help with this things, including:

- community transport schemes
- age-friendly employers
- midlife MOTs
- falls prevention
- campaigns to raise awareness about ageism and healthy ageing.



More Than Weight Programme promotes healthy habits rather than just weight loss. To improve overall health and well-being it focuses on:

- physical activity,
- nutritious food
- reducing weight stigma



#### Follow-up tasks:

Housing Adaptations: add questions about adaptations to the hot topic on housing. These will be covered in a Partnership Board meeting in the future



Radar Keys Information: Ensure the Council's website includes information about radar keys and changing places. Make sure this is easy to find.



**Transport Information:** Invite transport colleagues to provide an update on transport. including bus passes and disability awareness training for staff.

**Digital Access for Older People:** Raise the issue of GP surgeries moving to online-only access and its impact on older people at the Health and Care Partnerships meeting.
