There are many different types of legislation that we need to consider and adhere to within our working environment. The main reason for health and safety legislation is to protect people at work and those who are affected by work activities.



The Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 is often referred to as the main piece of legislation however there are others that need to be considered within our day to day duties. Here are just a few:


- Health & Safety First Aid Regulations 1980
- Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992
- Reporting of injuries, diseases and dangerous occurrences Regulations 1995
- Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999
- The lifting Operations and lifting equipment regulations 1998
- Provision and Use of Work Equipment Regulation 2002
- Control of substances Hazardous to Health 2002
- The Regulatory Reform (fire Safety) order 2005

As well as legislation there are organisational policies and procedures, safety guidance documents and specific safe systems of work. Be sure you know where these are kept. Make sure you read them and familiarise yourself with the contents.




